Native Orchids have been somewhat growing noticeable well this last year.

I have had the pleasure of seeing them in the wild, in their native environment on trees of particular species on private properties.

These Trees are some times of the Ironbark variety where the orchid has attached its self in the older broken limb, some on Gum trees with broken limbs from where storms have shattered the timber and made it easy for the young plants to slowly and most times 'on a wing and a prayer', stay safe and grow to bring us the beautiful specimens that must be, of many years old, and surviving through really harsh conditions.

There are literally hundreds growing on the chosen trees on the side of the road from the Boyne Valley to Bundaberg.

The Orchids most times grow on the eastern side of the host tree, but there are the lucky ones on the various directions of outer exposed limbs that survive on moisture from dew and rain and lots of luck...Ed

Dendrobium Beetle: (Stethopachys formosa)

This relentless creature is one of the most destructive orchid pests. Really it is fortunate that this pest only likes Dendrobium Orchids.

This beetle is native to Australia only and has been found in Northern N S W & Northern Territory.

This critter will eat any part of the Dendrobium plant.

The Females lay eggs on new growth, buds or flowers and these eggs hatch out in 10 days where the Larvae will tunnel into the new shoots which cause decimation of the area of its *living quarters*. The Larvae will pupate in a mass of white and waxy looking material similar to that of mealy bug; this then will protect the pest before the adult emerges. The life cycle is only for a few months.

The adult has a vibrant gold stripe with a black band across its bottom and 3 black markings at its shoulders. The Larvae are cream in colour, short and covered in slime like substance, then, when they pupate they produce whitish foam and are usually found at the base of the plant

The Larvae tunnel down in the pseudobulb and new shoots and the adults will eat the base of new leaves plus any part of a flower.

Keeping the beetle out of the Orchid House is one way of control, but applying a cocktail that has more effectiveness will make more sense.

Spray with a suitable insecticide for beetles. Confidor is one of the effective sprays. This process will need to be repeated in 2 weeks because the Larvae will be protected inside of the Dendrobium cane. It is then very important to thoroughly wet the plant with Confidor.
