#### Nomenclature – The written language of Horticulture

Before we can understand the names of orchids, what family they belong to, whether the plant is a species or a hybrid, we must understand basic nomenclature or the written language of horticulture.

To standardise the system throughout the world, the International Rules of Nomenclature and Registration were devised, laying down absolute rules on the written form of orchid names, abbreviations, etc.

The aim of plant nomenclature is to provide every kind of plant with an internationally agreed name that applies only to that particular plant. What we are concerned with here are the general principles of plant nomenclature as applied to orchids, how to write down correctly the names of both species and hybrids and recognise what is written on a label.

Let us look at a label and work out what is written on it and what it means:-

C. skinneri var. alba 'Pendentive'

or

C. skinneri var. alba 'Pendentive

Here we have a label, with the same orchid name written twice, each of which is correct.

THE GENUS On the label the C. is an abbreviation for Cattleya – the genus to which the orchid belongs. This is called the  $1^{st}$  TERM.

Species Within each genus, each species has a specific name (epithet) – in this case *skinneri* – this is a  $2^{nd}$  term – in a Latinised form. These  $1^{st}$  and  $2^{nd}$  terms reveal instantly that we have here an orchid species of the *Cattleya* genus identified as *skinneri*. When the  $1^{st}$  and  $2^{nd}$  terms are written down for a species they are always in italics or underlined.

The generic name *Cattleya* starts with a capital but the 2<sup>nd</sup> term is written with lower case letters (even when derived from a personal name).

A varietal epithet (3<sup>rd</sup> term) may be given to identify a particular variety within the species; this 3<sup>rd</sup> term is preceded by the abbreviation var. (in roman letters) and this 3<sup>rd</sup> term is written in italics or underlined and without a capital. Note that the abbreviation var. is in ordinary type, not italics and is not underlined.

Special individual clones may be given a cultivar epithet (4<sup>th</sup> term). This 4<sup>th</sup> term is not in a Latinised form – has a capital letter and is not in italics but it is enclosed in single quotation marks.

So much for species.

C. Princess Bells 'Betty's Bouquet'

**HYBRIDS** 

When writing the name of hybrids, the 1st term remains the same as for species. That is, the genus Cattleya has a capital – it is in italics or underlined.

The 2<sup>nd</sup> term in this case is Princess Bells. This is the registered name of the orchid hybrid, commonly known as the GREX. It is in roman letters – has capital letters starting each word.

The 3<sup>rd</sup> term 'Betty's Bouquet' is in roman letters, has a capital starting each word and is enclosed in single quotation marks.

Therefore, the label informs us that this particular orchid is a member of the genus Cattleya – is a hybrid registered as Princess Bells and is a clone with the specific name of 'Betty's Bouquet'.

Blc. Sylvia Fry 'Wallacia' FCC/AOC, AM/AOS

Sometimes when reading a label, book or catalogue you will come across odd groups of letters such as AM/AOS, FCC/AOC, AD/NSW and so on. These groups signify that the particular clone has been examined by a recognised panel of Orchid Judges and awarded a standard of excellency.
